Father's Day On Rodeo Drive

Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills is where you can get a suit for \$15,000. But the Concours d'Elegance on Sunday, June 19, Father's Day was free. The theme of this year's annual event on Rodeo Drive featured the Art of Italian Automobiles. Sunday there were Italian cars



spanning the time from a 1912 Fiat to the Bugatti Veyron. Purists may challenge on this point, but Ettore Bugatti was an Italian, who built beautiful and

fast cars *in France*. The 8 liter, W-16 engine that produces 1001 hp comes from VW in Germany. Speeds of 253 m.p.h. are reported on the new Bugatti Veyron.

Italian style and grace were also reflected by the cars from Alfa Romeo, Ferrari, Lamborghini, De Tommaso, Lancia, Maserati and, of course, Fiat.
